

example, World Wide Fund for Na-ture (WWF) in association with NCF has hinged on the recognition of the dire need for joint and shared promotion of conservation objectives. It is equally aimed at en-couraging both parties to gain strength and support through the development of a mutually beneficial relationship but today, this relationship has resulted in a number of conservation achievements.

Through NCF, the recipients of these scholarship have contributed to the continuous and steady growth of environmental education in Nigeria.

The WWF-UK/NCF, Integrated Environmental Awareness and Education Programme marked a unique point in the history of Environmental Education in the Nigerian Education System. Formal curricula have been developed for different educational lev els and the courses are now being run at the un-dergraduate and post graduate levels of some Nigerian Universities.

The RSPB sees biodiversity conservation and environmental improvement as part of a wider agenda of sustainable development.

NCF became a partner designate of Birdlife International in 1994 and by 1998 became a full partner. From then on, the foundation has played leadership role in the administration of the African Birdlife Partnership. In the 1990s when NCF coordinated the Interna tional Bird Areas (IBA) Survey for Nigeria, its partnership yielded noteworthy results among which was the documentation of Important Bird Areas in Nigeria.

Through partnership with Birdlife, NCF was able to host the global conservation community from Birdlife Interna-tional Offices all over the world at the Global Council and the Council for African Partnership (CAP) meeting in

Through Birdlife International Partnership, NCF part-nered with another Birdlife African Partner - Cameroun Biodiversity Conservation Society (CBCS) to implement a Transboundary collabora-tion for Ecosystem Conservation Project in and around montane forests of Gashaka Gumti National Park and Tchabal Mbabo in Cameroun.

NCF and Birdlife had jointwarned the government of Bauchi state on the proposed construction of the Jama'are Dam in Kafin Zaki area of the state. NCF and Birdlife had stated that the Dam would put the farmlands, fishing grounds and other means of livelihood of millions of people living downstream of the ma'are River in danger.

NCF and Flora and Fauna International (FFI) partner-

NCF has also through a network with NGOs like FFI, WCS and the Environment and Rural Development Foundation of Cameroon, engaged in conservation of endangered species and their habitats in developing countries.
